### Course description

This course aims to serve as a data-driven introduction to mathematical approaches to language. It explores the (extended) hierarchy of formal languages from a linguist's point of view, with an emphasis on classes that are of special interest for describing natural language phenomena. We will study, in a hands-on way, a number of grammar formalisms commonly used to characterize patterns in phonology, morphology, and syntax. The only prerequisite is familiarity with the basic notions of linguistics; no programming experience or extensive mathematical background is required.

## Grade components

Homework 70% Final exam 30%

**Homework:** There will be roughly one assignment per week. You are welcome to collaborate on homework with other students in the class, as long as you indicate who you worked with. However, you must do the actual write-up on your own. All homework is to be submitted electronically via Canvas.

**Final exam:** There will be a take-home exam covering all material introduced in class.
